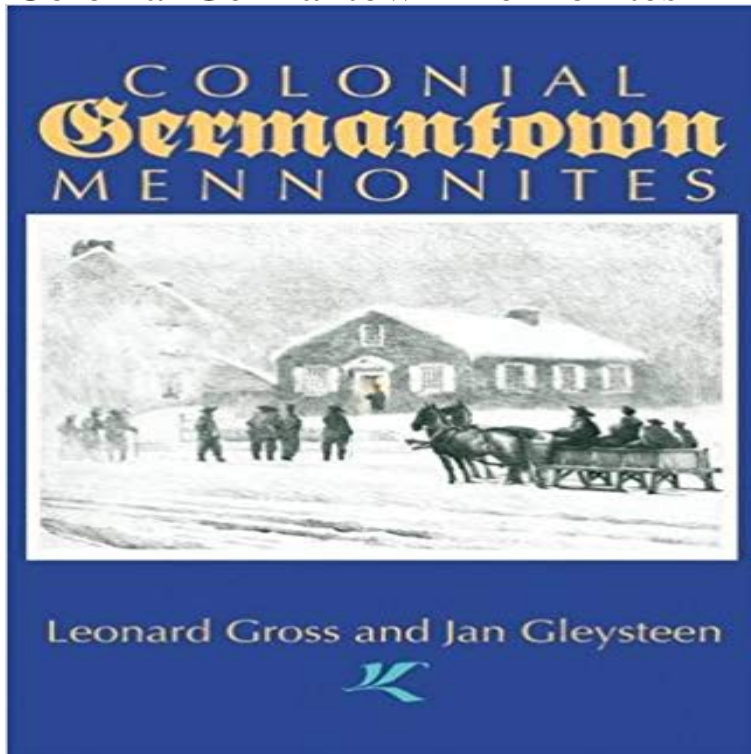


Colonial Germantown Mennonites
